

At the very core of parent choice philosophy is the belief that no single program or treatment will benefit all individuals with autism. Providing information and education to help in decision-making are more highly regarded at the Autism Society than is advocating for one particular theory or philosophy.

Selflessness, Dedication, and Courage By Andy Parsley Winner: Educator Category

I am the principal of St. Elizabeth School, a nonpublic middle and high school in Baltimore that serves the central Maryland region. About half of our students have autism. As a member of the St. Elizabeth School community, I am privileged to spend my days surrounded by people who exemplify three qualities: selflessness, dedication, and courage. Others have lives that cause them to doubt the central goodness of humanity; my experience is precisely the opposite.

Selflessness. I see it in the staff members every single day. Nobody is getting rich by working at my school and the work is often challenging, sometimes extremely challenging, but nobody is hanging their head in defeat. Instead, I see people asking more of themselves. They stay late to coach, decorate for prom, host the alumni group, plan a better lesson on the SMART Board, and complete IEP paperwork. They put smiles on their faces when they are tired, and they reserve any expression of grumpiness for their lunch break - if they have a lunch break. They know that in our line of work it is the daily experience of each and every student that matters, and they don't make excuses or settle for less when creating a positive experience proves difficult. I keep hearing news reports about how educators (my profession!) as a whole are a pretty sorry lot. My experience is precisely the opposite.

Dedication. I admire those who don't quit a just cause when the struggle is long and tough, those who choose to fight harder instead. Parents have amazed me over the years with dedication to their children that intensified when difficulties came at them from all directions: food and behavior issues, paying therapists and lawyers, concerns about the future, others who can't see past quirky behaviors to see their child's rich personality and abilities, lack of sleep, and more. I once saw a diagram that compared the nightly hours of sleep of children with and without autism. There was no overlap in the sample populations; every child with autism slept less than every child without autism. And yet I see so many tired parents keep on fighting, and I admire them for it.

Courage. With a little help, students at my school wrote and filmed *Autism, the Movie*, in which they talk openly about their lives. They don't describe a bed of roses, but they don't describe the toil of Sisyphus either. My favorite line: "I am blessed with autism. It will keep me out of jury duty and the army." In the students I see the courage and determination to define themselves, and I am immensely proud of them. It fills my heart to watch these young people grow, and to watch resilience grow within them.

In a world that sometimes seems filled with people who are self-interested, shallow, and spineless, I am blessed to spend my days surrounded by people who are precisely the opposite: selfless, dedicated, and courageous.

E ssex Program benefits Kids with A utism and T heir Parents

The Children's Developmental Class at the Essex campus of the Community College of Baltimore County is starting its fall program on Saturday, September 17th It meets from 9:30-10:45 a.m. in the campus' athletic building.

The program is for kids age 1-14 who have special needs (autism, ADD/ADHD, Down syndrome, shyness, cerebral palsy, communication disorders, etc.). While college student mentors (who are studying education, health, occupational therapy, etc.) work in the gym with the kids using the Floor T ime approach, they help develop communication skills, social engagement, fine and gross motor skills, balance/ coordination, and self-esteem.

In addition, while the kids are in the gym, the parents are invited to an information education/discussion group with speakers addressing various topics such as IE Ps, nutrition, advocacy, social and emotional health, etc.



Local Author Pens Book about Growing Up with an Autistic Sibling



Katherine Lashley's memoir, My Younger Older Sister, is a personal and candid account of her grow-

ing up with Vicki, her autistic older sister. Kate describes her grappling with her sister's adoption, their birth order role reversal, and the caretaking that she assumed when little more than a toddler herself. She tells of Vicki's wandering off and becoming lost, her finally beginning to speak at the age of five, and her failures in taking college courses and working a part-time job. The sisterly bond, sexuality, and faith are also covered in respects to the author's experiences with her sister. Told through the eyes of the younger sibling, My Younger Older Sister, addresses bluntly a number of the little disclosed and discussed areas of autism's affects on typical siblings. This book provides siblings of autistics the comfort and assurance of knowing that someone else has experienced similar embarrassments, regretful reactions, and hurtful disappointments, while rejoicing in small victories and retaining hope and faith.


